



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS AS A VOTER!

If you run into any issues at the polls, call **866-OUR-VOTE (866-687-8683)** and tell them you are a Native American/Alaska Native voter and request to be directed to a NARF attorney. You can also call if you have questions regarding state voter registration, identification, and other legal questions.

TOLD YOU CAN'T VOTE?

Ask for a "provisional ballot" to cast a vote that will be checked by election officials and counted if you are eligible. **Don't leave the polls without casting a ballot!**

WHEN TO CALL 866-OUR-VOTE

1. **You're told you can't vote because you don't have appropriate ID**
Note: ID requirements vary by state and tribal IDs are not an accepted for voting in all states.
2. **You believe you are registered to vote but are turned away.**
3. **You are denied a provisional ballot**
4. **You experience or see voter intimidation or harassment** by ICE, other federal law enforcement/military, police, or extremist groups
5. **The polling place where you go to vote is unexpectedly closed**
6. **You have a disability or need translation assistance but aren't allowed to bring someone to help you**
7. **Your jurisdiction doesn't provide required language assistance**

Note: Certain jurisdictions in AK, AZ, MI, WI, ID, NV, and TX are required to make elections accessible in one of several Native languages.



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
